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Hello! We are the Rainbow Pride Youth Alliance and we are an LGBTQ+ organization that focuses on youth from the ages of 11 to 17 with additional programming for Transitional-Aged Youth (T.A.Y.) from 18 to 26. We hold most of our programming in our San Bernardino offices in the Chase building and its surrounding areas!

**Our mission** is to provide a safe, healthy, and enriching environment for gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, queer, questioning, and intersex youth of the Inland Empire. We provide a safe space for young people to meet, make friends, and participate in various weekly events and activities.

**Advocacy:** We are committed to organizing, lobbying, and supporting community efforts to make the Inland Empire LGBTQ+ affirming.

**Education:** We aim to provide youth and parent/guardians psycho-educational support groups and LGBTQ+ education.

**Wellness:** We are dedicated to facilitating activities and programming that enriches the lives of LGBTQ+ folks. We are here to promote creativity, health, and wellness in queer youth!

Efren: How did RPYA start? What were its origins?

Benita: Well, the simplest way to put it was some young people wanted a support space for LGBTQ+ youth. [They] walked into the then LGBT center and said "Hey, we want a space to meet! We need support!" and that's how it got started.

Efren: I read on the website that the origin date was 2001 but I also heard 2008 is an important year. What were some important years for RPYA? How did RPYA get to where it is today?

Benita: The foundation of RPYA started in 98-99 but it became a formal organization. later. There were distinct periods of birth of the organization as a whole. [Paul Garcia and Aaron] were one of the first students that showed up to the first iteration of RPYA. The first iteration was just a few kids showing up on a Friday night hanging out and then it grew from there. It maybe started out with 15 to 20. Word of mouth started spreading it. It was really at its peak around 2007 when there were not a lot of GSAs on school campuses. This was during a period where there weren't any resources, not even in LA so it was unique! It was a spot where they could just go and be themselves. We were really formalizing as an organizational structure; we had an active board, an active condary of volunteers and our first Executive Director, At the time I was Board Secretary, intermittently governing aspects of the org.

The new period began in 2008. Around that time, we had our 7nd executive director Maggie Hawkins and I was board president. Maggie led us for about 2 years and [she] helped us make more connections in the community. From 2008–2017, I would say, was another period of drought. We really struggled with place, outreach, volunteers,

staffing. As things started opening up for [LGBT04] adults, they started opening up for [LGBT04] kids. We started having a lull but we still had theater activities going, we had a couple [of] creative events, field trips. We maintained a low key presence.

Between 2018-2020, we partnered up with the local faith organization and the department of behavioral health in Riverside county and started Source. [Source] was a play on what we had already started with our support groups [that was] endorsed and encouraged [by outside orgs]. We were very fortunate that we partnered with a school nearby from where we were meeting. Whether they were coming because we had pizza or if they were coming because they really like the fellowship [students] would come! It was right after school from 3:30 to 5:30. They would walk across the street to the library and tell their parents to pick them up from there. No one would know the difference.

We [also] got funding from the Kaiser Family Foundation to do a suicide prevention campagin for LGBTQ youth and we partnered with public health in Riverside county. From there, [they] expanded our activities in suicide prevention to opioid prevention. [They even] extended [our] grant for that so we were able to do programs, outreach, and education to the community on a whole 'nother level. We weren't just focused on GSAs bringing young people into our support groups, we were also focussed on going where they were.

Then, [in 2020] COVID hit. Our big programming [was] around how we were meeting people where they were at. Alt of a sudden, that's been snatched away. What did we do? Well, we went virtual! We did a virtual prom. [We did] a mini conference on racial healing and equity because we were also sandwiched in between the protests that were happening so we had this [simultaneous] pandemic going on. We were trying to be responsive and present to that from home.

As things started opening back up, GSA advisors started reaching out saying, "The kids need you!" so we started transitioning back into school.

What COVID did for us was that it gave us an opportunity to target our community with some messaging around mitigating COVID fandl getting the vaccine. [We made] sure that we had wellness at our forefront as our siblings were dying all over the country. We wanted to see what we could do to advance information and knowledge in our areas. That stabilized us. It allowed us to go from 3 staff members to 25. It allowed us to send out an army of folks into the community to help with food distribution, toys, school supplies, [and] backpacks. We were doing text and phone banking, door to door canvassing, spreading the message that "you matter". It didn't matter what your race, ethnicity, sexual, or gender identity [was], we wanted people to know that there were folks who looked and loved like them who wanted to affirm their existence. Every kind of thing that was able to be delivered and carried out to somebody, we were right there doing that. Art walk really took off for us. It really became a part of our pattern of outreach and engagement. That was a big deal.

And so here we are today, making another pivot! [We are] finding another way to do outreach in the community to send a message of hope and resilience through the zines. The zines have become a library of information for folks. It says, here's what we're thinking on this topic. Here's the information you need to lead a healthy and sex-positive life and to help fight the viruses of today and tomorrow!

Efren: That's amazing! I remember you mentioned field trips and programming from the early days of RPYA. Which were most significant that you think were vital in the development of RPYA?

Benita: There was one field trip with about

15 young people that took a plane to San Francisco. [We] went to visit one of the largest LGBTQ centers in the country. They serve LGBTQ youth, homeless youth, and youth of different backgrounds. [Our youth] really wanted to go out and see what people did in other more liberal communities. This gave them access to dream big about what might be possible for us to do in a conservative community that wants us to be invisible. That was one significant activity that I think gained young people a sense of purpose. It guided how we developed our initial messaging out of our planning board. In the fall, we also have Q Camp where we take 50 young people who are interested in having a GSA at their campus. We have leadership development, training and talks about techniques [about] how they [can] build the capacities of their schools to handle their GSA

# **Programming: Source Youth Group**


RPYA's source group is for LGBTQ+ youth between the ages of 11-18 who are looking for a space that supports them. We provide workshops and
